CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Our college has affiliation with M.D. University, Rohtak and strictly follows its instructions. We also act upon the guidelines issued by the Director General Higher Education, Haryana. Our college has two semesters in one academic session and we adopt the mechanism for effective delivery of curriculum accordingly. Following is the mechanism for effective delivery of curriculum in our institution. Odd semester begins on the 1st July of each year and admissions schedule is made clear to all members of teaching staff in the meeting convened by the Principal at the beginning of the session. Time tables of all streams are framed. Syllabus of each stream is displayed on the notice boards. Lesson plans are prepared to cover the syllabus in time. Class tests are held in the month of October and November to assess the academic progress of the students. Students are asked to prepare assignments on the given topics and attendance of students is regularly marked. Group discussions are arranged in the classrooms to motivate students to do better in future. Slow learners get special attention from the teachers and they are taken care of in a friendly manner. Hard topics are made interesting by citing examples from books of eminent academicians. Group discussions are held for comprehensive and exhaustive study of a topic. Inter class quiz contests, based on syllabus, are also held. General Quiz contests based on General knowledge of current topics

are also held. Essay competition of students of all streams is also held once in a semester. We use models and charts, chalk and blackboard in classrooms.

Teachers distribute class notes to the students. Practical classes are effectively held in the subject of Geography. Educational tours of boys and girls of each stream are also organized to hill stations and historical places. The college arranges special talks of academicians for motivation of students.

Library also provides good facility to students. They can read books, newspapers, magazines etc. in their vacant periods. Computer labs imparts basic knowledge of computer and English language lab teaches them soft skill and transcriptions. Our college follows the schedule of M.D. University for semester and annual examinations. We conduct examination as per the guidelines of M.D. University, Rohtak.

<p>A questionnaire containing many questions related to our college administration, teaching-learning process, students' performance, their behaviour, teachers' methodology, their attitude towards students etc. was distributed to students to seek their responses. Questions related to assignments, cleanliness and attendance were also put in the questionnaire. Their responses were also sought regarding ragging, women safety, cleanliness of college campus and availability of net and Wi-Fi in the college. After analyzing the responses of the students, we found that their responses were positive to a large extent. Their general opinion was that teachers' attitude in the classrooms has been friendly and they help the students to develop self-confidence. They could easily approach teachers in their free time to clear their doubts. Teachers also made the topic interesting for a better understanding of the concept. Students' responses reflected that teachers maintained egalitarian attitude towards all students despite the fact that learners level of understanding is different. They had been kind, compassionate, humble and forgiving in the classrooms and outside the classrooms. Our teachers willingly shared emotions and feelings with the students. The students also responded that they got education in a very healthy environment. There was no problem of ragging in the institution. Attendance was regularly marked and assignments were given to students once in a semester. Two class tests were taken by the students in a semester. There was no problem of electricity and girls safety was managed on priority basis. Students always found the college campus quite clean with beautiful green parks, tree and plants. There was no problem of electricity in the college. Washrooms and toilets were regularly-washed and cleaned. An effective teacher believes that every student can learn and progress in any field. M.D. University issues instructions to colleges from time to time for continuous internal evaluation of students. We have semester system in our College and the session is divided in to odd and even semesters. The institution adopts following methodology to assess the potential of the students

Attendance: - Attendance of students is regularly marked students are encouraged to attend their classes. Time table of each stream is displayed on the time table and every student is directed to note down it. **Group discussion:** - We try our level best is making hard topics interesting so that the concept may be made clean to students. We treat every student equally in a friendly manner. Weak students are not rebuked by harsh word but are stimulated to perform better in the group discussion. We provide them a platform so that they can expose their hidden talent and potential without hesitation teachers are there with them in the classroom to solve any problem on the spot. **Quiz Contest:** - Quiz contest and group discussion are best plate form for continuous evaluation of students. General Quiz contests are hard in the College. The Questions are related nearly all subjects of all streams, general knowledge current affairs and world economy to motivate them for a bright future. **Assignments and class tests:** - two class tests and one assignment in each semester are given to students to know their academic progress their answer sheets are shown to students. Their mistakes are pointed out without hurting their emotions internal marks are awarded to every student on the basic of class tests, assignments and attendance.

2.5.3 - Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters At the beginning of the session, Principal of the college convenes a meeting of teaching staff and issues all necessary instruction related to academic calendar of the institution. We obey all the directive of M.D. University, Rohtak all the college under this University have semester system. In one academic session, we have two semesters odd and even. The college odd semester begins from 1st July and ends on 31st December. The even semester starts from 1st January and ends till the examinations are over i.e. 31st May. Admissions of students last for 15th July. Then timetable of all streams are framed and displayed on the notice board. Syllabi of every stream are also displayed on the notice board. Students are informed of the class tests and assignments. Special talks by learned professors are arranged to motivate students. Teaching work is effectively cared out as per the lesson plans. Annual examinations are held under the guidelines of M.D. University, Rohtak. Date-sheet of examinations of all streams is released by the University. We follow the directions of the above-said University regarding internal assessment marks. These marks are awarded to students on the basis of their performance in class tests, assignments and attendance in the College/Classrooms. We have a good library where there is an arrangement of separate reading rooms for boys and girls where they can read magazines, book and newspapers in their vacant periods education ovals tours of students of all streams are also conducted as per the guidelines issued by the Director General Higher Education, Haryana special grant is released for this purpose.

A sports committee is also formed which looks after the playground, equipment and sports activities. The playground remains available to the students ever before and after the college hours. The beautiful playground of the college has been successful in creating a sporting culture in the nearby villages as the youth from the neighboring area can make use of the playground for sports related activities in the evening. Keeping in view the strength of the college, there is a good number of computers in the college. Students and staff have access to computers and internet in the computer labs. Besides this, the college offers a certificate course in computer subject to every students of the college which is a very good development in this rural and backward part of the state.
